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Airfreight rides e-commerce to surprise growth in May

onventional thinking suggests the unexpected strength of the air cargo market so far this year is ready to cool off for the summer, as freight activity normally does each year. It's not happening – yet.

Global airfreight volumes didn't subside after China's Lunar New Year holiday in February, as many industry professionals anticipated, and are still going strong, albeit with ebbs and flows. The primary catalysts remain Asian exporters shifting modes because of slower ocean transits around the Red Sea conflict zone and robust bookings by Chinese e-commerce platforms fulfilling orders in Europe and North America.

Air cargo demand grew 11% year over year in April — the fourth month in a row that has happened, according to rate benchmarking platform Xeneta. The International Air Transport Association, widely followed by the broader public, also reported lagging data showing volumes grew 10.3% in March and 13% during the first quarter. Sector volume has increased by double digits for five consecutive months, cementing the recovery trend from a steep downcycle that began in 2022.

And the momentum has carried over into early May with volumes up 12% to 16%, the latest data from WorldACD and Xeneta show.

Demand growth for air transport has tapered slightly in the Indian subcontinent and Southeast Asia as ocean shipping schedules around the Red Sea conflict have become more predictable and cargo owners order goods with longer delivery times in mind, but volumes are still significant by historical standards. A short dip in April related to the Muslim Eid holiday and flooding at Dubai airport was replaced by a surge in flower volumes from Central and South America.

North America is the primary destination market for flowers shipped by air, consuming more than 60% of all flowers flown from Latin America and Africa combined, WorldACD said.

Colombia-based Latam Airlines, for example, said it moved more than 24,000 tons of flowers in the three weeks leading up to the Mother's Day holiday, marking a 20% increase compared to the same period last year. Volumes out of Central and South America are now coming down with the passage of Mother's Day.

The improved business climate is reflected in cargo revenues reported by airlines for the first quarter, with year-overyear declines much narrower than every quarter last year. Air France-KLM's cargo revenues, for example, declined 16.5% compared to 23% in the fourth quarter and saw a 29% drop for the full year against 2022.

At the same time, cargo capacity has increased about 5% y/y as passenger airlines throw more aircraft into action for their big summer schedules, decreasing load efficiency by 3 points to 59%, said Xeneta.

Asia-Pacific air exports remain particularly robust with volumes up 13% in April (but only flat compared to 2019). And after a post-Lunar New Year dip, spot rates on the eastbound corridor from northeast Asia to the U.S. have rebounded by more than 30% y/y, according to Xeneta. Meanwhile, air shipping prices out of the Middle East and southwest Asia are up 42% y/y because of the longer ocean transit times around Africa.

MSC AIR CARGO CONTINUES FLEET EXPANSION

MSC Air Cargo has taken delivery of its fifth freighter as it continues to expand its all-cargo fleet.

The carrier took delivery of its latest Boeing 777 freighter (HMSCA) late last week. The aircraft, which

carries an MSC livery and has been named Alfirk, will be based in Milan. Jannie Davel, senior vice president of MSC Air Cargo, said the aircraft will "enhance our efficiency and capabilities to better service our customers and trade lanes" in a LinkedIn post. According to fleet site PlaneSpotters, the aircraft was originally ordered by Air Canada Cargo before the Montreal-headquartered airline cancelled its plans to take on 777Fs due to weakening air cargo market conditions.

Lufthansa Cargo targets North America with freighter <u>expansion</u>

Lufthansa Cargo will expand its presence in North America with the launch of a new freighter service and an increase in bellyhold frequencies to other destinations.

The Frankfurt-hubbed freighter operator will launch a Boeing 777 freighter service to the Mexican city of Monterrey on June 3, with bookings now available.

The service rotation heads from Frankfurt (FRA) to Mexico City (NLU) and then onwards to Monterrey International Airport (MTY) and back to Frankfurt.

Flights will operate on a Monday and Lufthansa reckoned the service would be of interest to automotive suppliers, electronics providers, and customers transporting medical products.

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MAERSK AIRLINE PREPARES TO DEPLOY FIRST 777 FREIGHTERS FOR PEAK SEASON



Maersk Air Cargo currently operates 21 Boeing 767 freighters and will soon add two Boeing 777s to the fleet

Maersk continues to move ahead with plans to grow its air cargo business in 2024 even as many competitors pull back in the wake of a painful downturn, culminating with a milestone next quarter when Boeing expects to deliver the first two 777s for the airline operation.

LUFTHANSA CARGO ADDS MONTERREY TO FREIGHTER FLIGHT SCHEDULE

Lufthansa Cargo customers can now book their freight from Frankfurt to the Mexican city of Monterrey. "From June 3, 2024, the logistics expert will offer a connection from its home hub to the North American city. The entire route goes from Frankfurt to Mexico City, then onwards to Monterrey International Airport and back to Frankfurt," says an official release. A B777F will operate

on the new route every Monday, which should be interesting for automotive suppliers, electronics providers and customers t r a n s p o r t i n g medical products, the release added.

Alaska Air starts Los Angeles freighter service with 737-700F

Alaska Air Cargo has begun a new twiceweekly freighter service from Anchorage to Los Angeles through Seattle in April 2024.

The airline informed that, starting later in May, the LAX route will be served by the larger 737-800BCF freighters, which have 10,000 pounds more capacity per aircraft than their existing 737-700s.

The new freighter service to Los Angeles is Alaska Air's first beyond Seattle in the lower 48, and it increases its capacity to meet a growing demand for air freight services in industries up and down the West Coast.

The increased capacity provides new connections to carry larger, palletized parts and supplies between the two

hubs for aerospace, biotechnology and other industries w h o s e operations depend on time-critical shipments.





MAERSK LAUNCHES AIR FREIGHT GATEWAY IN MIAMI

A.P. Moller - Maersk expanded its air freight operations footprint with the April activation of a full-service, intransit gateway solution in Miami.



"This new air freight facility underscores

Maersk's commitment to providing seamless and competitive connectivity to major Latin American markets. The Miami gateway will serve as a strategic node in Maersk's global air freight network," reads the release.

"Our Miami expansion is a vital and strategic addition to our global gateway network, providing connectivity from Asia, Europe, and the US to Latin America," said, John Wetherell, global head of air freight forwarding at Maersk.

The new gateway, modelled after operations in Atlanta, Chicago, and Los Angeles, will focus on transhipping European and Asian cargo via Miami to Latin America with competitive connectivity on freighter and passenger capacity. It will support the North American export market to Latin America and the Asian market that serves the Latin American supply chain via cost competitive U.S. routes.

MAERSK OPENS ROTTERDAM CROSS-DOCK FACILITY TO ACCELERATE CARGO FLOW

Maersk has expanded its container supply chain services to European shippers with the launch of a new cross-dock facility at its Maasvlakte II terminal in Rotterdam yesterday.

Starbucks is the launch customer, which will "accelerate the flow of cargo significantly from arrival on a vessel to the point of sale", Maersk said. After discharging containers from an arriving vessel, products can be unpacked, transloaded to conventional trucks and dispatched to their final destination within hours.



TOWER COLD CHAIN OFFERS EVOLUTION IN PHARMA SHIPPING

Passive temperature-controlled container supplier Tower Cold Chain has developed an ultra-lightweight product compatible with US and EU pallets. The Evolution 1600 Tower Universal Pallet is said to be suitable for all shipping needs, "meeting industry standards for a truly pan-global container". As such, Reading, UK-headquartered Tower Cold Chain, said: "It gives the pharmaceutical and life sciences markets unparalleled levels of efficiency and versatility in their cold chain operations." It can maintain the temperature pharmaceutical integrity of shipments between -60°C to +20°C and has a runtime of 120 hours without needing electrical power or manual intervention during transit. In fact, Tower believes, the Evolution 1600 represents "the optimum balance between size, weight and volumetric efficiency".

CMA CGM joins intra-Asia consortium to boost its market share

CMA CGM is looking to consolidate its footing in the intra-Asia trades, as the market's potential grows in response to diversifying supply chains in Asia.

The French liner will deploy three vessels to a consortium of six Asian regional lines to operate a butterfly string, designed with two strings.

The vessel-sharing agreement also includes three ships from Emirates Shipping Line and one each from Pacific International Lines, RCL Feeder, KMTC, CU Lines and Global Feeder Shipping, with capacities ranging between 4,000 and 6,000 teu.

Branded VGI by CMA CGM, the intra-Asia network connects markets across India, the Middle East, Malaysia, Vietnam, Thailand and Singapore.







HMM & SM Line cooperate on Transpacific lane amid alliance shuffle

HMM and SM Line are working together on longhaul routes for the first time. On 13 May, SM Line said that



each carrier will take 300 TEU on each other's Asia-US West Coast services, starting in June. HMM will take slots on SM Line's CPX (China Pacific Express) which calls at Qingdao, Shanghai, Ningbo, Busan, Incheon, Gwangyang, Los Angeles, Oakland, Long Beach, and Portland. CPX uses six 6,655 TEU ships, with a six-week turnaround.

SM Line will take slots on HMM's Pacific South Express (PSX), which calls at Shanghai, Gwangyang, Busan, Los Angeles, Oakland, Busan, Gwangyang, Incheon and Shanghai. PSX turns in seven weeks, using six ships of 8,600 to 10,000 TEUs. A seventh vessel, the new 13,800 TEU HMM Emerald, will join the service later this month.

SM Line joins other THE Alliance members, Hapag-Lloyd, ONE and Yang Ming Marine Transport in slotting on PSX.

The cooperation between South Korea's two ocean-going carriers coincides with the upheaval in container shipping alliances.

LARGEST CONTAINER SHIP TO ARRIVE IN INDIA DOCKS AT ADANI'S MUNDRA PORT



AdPorts and Special Economic Zone Ltd (APSEZ)'s flagship Mundra Port created a milestone by welcoming the largest container ship ever to call at an Indian port after the MSC Anna vessel docked at the Mundra Port on Sunday, the conglomerate said in a press release.

MSC Anna has an overall length of 399.98 m (roughly the length of four football fields) and has a huge capacity of 19,200 twenty-foot equivalent units (TEU), which makes it the largest container ship by capacity to ever visit an Indian port.

CMA CGM TO RESHUFFLE AFRICA-INDIA-MIDDLE EAST SERVICES

MIDAS 1

Coega will be added to the MIDAS I rotation offering an optimised pathway for shipments through competitve transit times to Jebel Ali and India. The service will be tailored to enhance efficiency and meet the demand of the citrus season export.

Durban will be the unique port of call in South Africa for **MIDAS 2** and Pointe des Galets will be transferred to CMA's new KARIBU service. Port Elizabeth will be offered on a weekly basis via Durban through dedicated feeder solution with faster transit times.

"MIDAS 2 will still be operated in 49 days with 7 vessels up to 2,800 TEU Nominal, starting with m/v CMA CGM VALPARAISO, ETA Jebel Ali on April 22nd, 2024 and ETA Durban on May 14th, 2024," reads the release. **The rotation is:** Jebel Ali – Mundra – Nhava Sheva – Durban – Jebel Ali

KARIBU

HAX service will be replaced by KARIBU, a weekly service fully operated by CMA CGM.

NEW SHIPPING ROUTES HIGHLIGHT GROWING ASIA-TO-MEXICO TRADE

A new sea route from Cosco Shipping Lines became operational on Monday, as several global ocean carriers have initiated services targeting Asia-to-Mexico trade.

In addition to cosco, global ocean carriers have initiated services targeting Asia-to-Mexico trade.

In addition to Cosco, global ocean carriers Mediterranean Shipping Co. and CMA CGM have launched services to tap into soaring container volumes and growing investment in Mexico by Chinese companies.

Cosco Shipping Lines and its subsidiary OOCL's new Transpacific Latin Pacific 5 (TLP5) line offer direct connections between China, South Korea, Japan and Mexico.

"To enhance our network coverage in the emerging markets, we are very pleased to launch a new service TLP5 in our Asia Latin America network to provide a comprehensive port coverage in the regions," OOCL said in a news release.

TLP5 offers transit times of 15 and 20 days from Qingdao, China, to the ports of Ensenada and Manzanillo, Mexico, respectively. The service will

utilize eight ships of 4,000 to 6,000 TEU. TLP5 launched with the 5,668-TEU vessel Xin Da Lian from Ningbo, China.

Port rotation for TLP5 includes Busan, South Korea; Dalian, China; Ningbo; Shanghai; Qingdao; Ensenada; Manzanillo; Ensenada; Yokohama, Japan; and returning to Busan.

China boosts its Mexico investments as nearshoring opportunities grow French carrier CMA CGM will launch M2X – Mexico Express Service on Saturday, connecting China, South Korea and Japan to Mexico's ports of Manzanillo and Lazaro Cardenas.

"Our new service, M2X – Mexico Express, is specifically designed to streamline shipments from the Far East to Mexico's West Coast," Marseille, France-based CMA CGM said in a news release. "This initiative aligns with market dynamics in the region."

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M2X – Mexico Express will run on a weekly fixedday basis and be operated by eight ships of so far undisclosed capacity, with a port rotation of Tianjin, China; Qingdao; Busan; Ensenada; Manzanillo; Lazaro Cardenas; Yokohama; Busan; and Tianjin. M2X also directly connects reefer exports from Mexico to markets in China and Japan.

MSC is launching a loop shuttle service connecting Asia to Mexico starting May 15. The first voyage of MSC's new loop shuttle service will be the MSC Apollo sailing from the Port of Qingdao.

Import container bookings from China to Mexico have skyrocketed over the past year, with Chinese direct investments in the country increasing 11% year over year in 2023 to \$135 billion. While it is difficult to definitively say what is driving the demand for more ocean container service between the two countries, experts have theorized everything from nearshoring of manufacturing to Mexico to the ongoing geopolitical tensions between the U.S. and China as reasons for the surge in shipments from China to Mexico.





Adani Ports Mundra Enhances Global Connectivity With ONE
